





From the Archives

In 1964 as Plymouth prepared to host their first NACCC annual meeting an article about the church appeared in the Congregationalist quoting Plymouth's minister Walter Couch as saying:

Some church members may feel that the pulpit should never concern itself with burning controversial issues. I assume the traditional right of Congregational ministers to speak to their congregations on whatever matters seem to them to be of Christian concern.

Thus in previous sermons I have dealt directly with some of the problems related to race. I fervently hope, though, that as I have exercised my prerogative, I have spoken the truth, as I see it, in love; and with humility, for this subject is exceedingly complex, and I make no claim to have all the answers. We cannot help facing up to the problem.

Plymouth Hallway Art Gallery

The art of Stephen Perry, a fourth generation Wichitan, will be on display in our hall-way for the next several weeks. Stephen has shown with us before and is always popular with Plymouth members and friends. A graduate of North High School and Kansas State University, Steve's career began in landscape architecture with an early interest in pen and ink sketches. After his retirement from his firm McCluggage Van Sickle and Perry, he began fine art printmaking in his Riverside home. In his Backroads Press studio he is currently working with photo-polymer plates in relief prints highlighted with watercolor. In 2011 he published his second book, "Wander the Kansas Flint Hills in Words and Images", which features 12 original prints and writings about his favorite part of Kansas. He continues to exhibit at art fairs and galleries throughout the region.

Plymouth Hallway Display Case

Hanna Eastin grew up in NE Tennessee, went to undergrad in Illinois, and moved to Newton, KS in 2001. Since then she has been a studio assistant, a gallery, bookshop, and coffeeshop co-owner, artist-in-residence, adjunct faculty, and professor of art. In the middle of all this she completed an MFA at Fort Hays State University and learned how to test wild clay, among several other things. She is currently finishing her 13th year on the faculty at Hesston College, after which, she will move to Salt Lake City full time to pursue partnership, parenting, substitute teaching, and studio work. With her partner, Cristi, and two young boys, they have been learning the great skill of family road tripping back and forth to Kansas to finish work at Hesston College, spend time with the boys' dad, and see the sights between Utah and Kansas. Which brings us to Hanna's clay work. In the past 8 years or so, Hanna's great passion has become finding and digging wild clays. Much of her work now consists of a stoneware made from Kansas clay from the area surrounding Wilson Lake and glazed with many different clays from Utah, Wyoming, and most recently a great, crusty find from roadside I70 in western Colorado. As a person who has always found great solace in Place, and now embarking on what feels like an awful lot of change, locating and testing these very Place Specific materials has given Hanna great joy. She makes small sculptures, drinking vessels, storage jars, and decorative objects like platters and wall tiles out of these materials, often incorporating clays from customers' own property, to commemorate time and place and human connection.
