
From Psalm 65



Conductor Tim Seelig will lead choirs from Plymouth Congregational, College Hill United Methodist, Bethel College in Joseph Martin's "Song of Wisdom from Old Turtle." The piece will be accompanied by a chamber orchestra and narrated by Tim and Karen Robu.



Tim Seelig is conductor, singer, speaker and educator. He continues a busy schedule of appearances across the U.S. He is the Conductor Laureate of the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus and Conductor Emeritus of the Turtle Creek Chorale.

Dr. Seelig holds four degrees, including the Doctor of Musical Arts degree and the Diploma from the prestigious Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria. He has six published books and DVDs on choral technique.

He has conducted 50 recordings which have been on Billboard Top Ten and iTunes Top Ten charts. His choruses have been the topic of three award-winning documentaries. He made his European operatic debut in St. Gallen, Switzerland and his solo recital debut at Carnegie Hall.

His autobiographical memoir, "Tale of Two Tims," was released June, 2020.
