Plymouth Art Gallery Hallway Art

Virgil Penner, a resident of North Newton KS, is known for his detailed, architectural ink drawings of homes and buildings. However, since retiring in 2009 as the CEO of the Newton Chamber of Commerce, he has focused on acrylic landscape paintings.

Virgil studied art under Marie Orr for four years at Newton High School. Miss Orr turned out professional students in her teaching career at NHS. After college Virgil taught Physical Education and coached in Wichita high schools (Northwest and Heights, from 1971-1983) and at Bethel College.

Virgil's acrylic paintings are bright, colorful, and whimsical. He constructs his paintings from memory as he does not paint on location or from photographs. By doing this he feels he can develop balance and movement in his paintings. His landscape paintings experiment with color, perspective, and creative composition.

Since October 2009 Virgil has painted over 690 paintings and sold over 580. Two of his most recent exhibitions were at CityArts in Wichita and the Graceful Arts Gallery in Alva OK. A recent quote from the Alva Review-Courier newspaper concludes with some of Mr. Penner's thoughts on his paintings: "For me art is not what you see, it's what makes you feel. Like music, you don't see anything in music, you feel. And art is a feeling experience."

Adult Ed Begins Wednesday Night September 13 Following Dinner

We will study the latest book by Bart Ehrman, our Word & Note Speaker in 2024, "Armageddon, What the Bible Really Says About the End." Syllabuses are available from Dr. Olsen, who will lead the class. We will discuss the Preface and chapter 1 on the 13th. Books may be purchase online or at local bookstores. Here's what the critics say:



You'll find nearly everything the Bible says about the end in the Book of Revelation: a mystifying prophecy filled with bizarre symbolism, violent imagery, mangled syntax, confounding contradictions, and very firm ideas about the horrors that await us all. But no matter what you think Revelation reveals—whether you read it as a literal description of what will soon come to pass, interpret it as a metaphorical expression of hope for those suffering now, or only recognize its highlights from pop culture—you're almost certainly wrong.

In Armageddon, acclaimed New Testament authority Bart D. Ehrman delves into the most misunderstood—and possibly most dangerous—book of the Bible, on a "vigilantly persuasive" (The Washington Post) tour through three millennia of Judeo-Christian thinking about how our world will end. Trustees Report to the Congregation

- Plymouth Congregational Church Board of Trustees report to the congregation as of August 31, 2023.
- Listed below are the projects that the Board has or will be dealing with this year and some projects scheduled for 2024.
- Architectural/engineering services for the possible expansion of the Preschool Learning Center (PSLC) are in progress with presentation to the PSLC board, Church boards and the Church membership later this fall. \$25,000.
- The north entry door and closure into fellowship hall was repaired. \$2,052.
- A roof top HVAC unit (heating, ventilating, air condition) was replaced. \$10,500. The replacement of the broken sewer line serving the lower level women's restroom has been contracted for with work to start soon. \$31,988.
- The waterproofing of the basement walls around the sanctuary west foyer area has been contracted for with work to start soon. \$43,930.
- Waterproofing of the south stair tower of the sanctuary has been contracted for with work to start soon. \$25,780.
- Demolition of the shrubs and dead trees around the courtyard and sanctuary has been completed. \$4,930.
- Installation of larger yard drain inlets and piping to the street in the courtyard and the south side of the sanctuary has been completed with lawn sprinkler repairs and additional sod/grass work pending. \$11,750. Additional piping to the street is pending coordination with the basement waterproofing work. \$7,850. Landscaping will be addressed in 2024.
- The west sanctuary exterior window over the balcony has been repaired and repainted. \$18,640.
- The exterior block wall on the south side of the sanctuary where the old entrance to the commons was will be waterproofed this fall. \$4,250.
- A number of other maintenance repairs or equipment replacements have been or are being made to the building and grounds as conditions require.
- In 2024, the balance of the sanctuary exterior stone will be cleaned, tuck pointed and sealed. That work is under contract. \$194,195.
- In 2024, the educational wing exterior stone and brick will be cleaned, tuck pointed and sealed. That work is under contract. \$148,185.
- Funding for these projects comes from the PSLC, the Plymouth Endowment Foundation, the Trustees capital fund and/or the Church's operating budget.

Recently, a group of Plymouth leaders met to discuss the current church priorities, their timelines, and their coordination in relationship to the church's leadership transition. The group included the moderator, the moderator-elect, the chair of the trustees, the co-chairs of the stewardship campaign, and three past moderators. The group concluded the following in regard to the transition.

TRANSITION MESSAGES

Plymouth will be undergoing a transition over the next two years as Dr. Olsen plans to retire in June 2025. We are most fortunate to have this much lead time and Dr. Olsen's continued involvement. A transition affords us the **opportunity** to do the following:

- Assess where we are as a congregation
- Determine where we are going and how we will get there
- Formulate specific goals & objectives that include current priorities such as our building maintenance plan, the proposed preschool expansion, and membership growth and retention

To implement the transition activities, the Cabinet will appoint a Transition Committee this fall and has approved a process for doing so. The Committee will be composed of the following::

- Two members of the Board of Trustees
- Two members of the Deacons
- Two at-large members
- The moderator
- The moderator-elect

Note: A small nominating committee composed of Cabinet members will determine the representatives from the Deacons and Trustees as well as those who submit their names for the at-large positions.

Activities will include:

(Timeline: November 2023 – March 2024)

- Reviewing our 2023 spring survey results
- Conducting a minister attribute survey
- Completing the Church Information Form
- Creating a position description that incorporates the above feedback
- Determining the need for a search

Communication is always important and becomes even more so during this time. The Transition Committee will include updates in the weekly E Blast, the Sunday Bulletin, at Wednesday night dinners, and in church announcements.
